

About the School Breakfast Program

The School Breakfast Program (SBP) is a federally funded meal program that plays a vital role in ensuring that all students have access to a nutritious meal to start their day. As part of the School Nutrition Association's (SNA) mission, we encourage our members to promote National School Breakfast Week (NSBW) and highlight the importance of a healthy breakfast in fueling academic success and overall well-being.

Studies show that children who eat breakfast are more likely to achieve higher academic scores, maintain better concentration and be more alert throughout the day. Additionally, they tend to score higher on standardized tests and experience improved memory retention. Breakfast is a crucial factor in helping students stay energized and focused, contributing to improved attendance rates and fewer behavioral issues.

The School Breakfast Program serves over 12 million meals daily across the nation, providing children with a healthier breakfast option compared to fast food or meals eaten at home. By celebrating NSBW, we emphasize the benefits of a balanced breakfast in creating a strong foundation for the day ahead.

Why This Theme?

The detective/mystery theme for the 2025 observance of National School Breakfast Week adds an element of excitement and curiosity, making the learning process about nutrition both interesting and enjoyable for students.

	Define Roles and Responsibilities: Clearly outline who's solving which parts of the puzzle. From decorating to social media, assign team members their investigative tasks.
	Gear Up Early: Visit the SNA Shop to snag official NSBW25 merchandise, like decorations, giveaways and detective-themed gifts. Place your order early to ensure it arrives in time to crack the case.
	Proclamation on File: Download SNA's sample proclamation and get your city council or school board involved early.
	Alert Leadership: Notify school principals and administrators to obtain approvals and support.
	Team Huddle: Assemble your crew, set deadlines and finalize your timeline to keep the investigation on track.
	Spread the Word: Use SNA's customizable press releases to alert media, special guests and local legislators.
	Create Buzz: Share updates and countdowns with SNA's Social Media Kit to make #NSBW25 the talk of the school and community.
	Costume Coordination: Encourage team members to don detective-inspired attire, like trench coats, magnifying glasses or hats. Provide safety guidelines for wearing costumes during food prep and service.

Suit up in a sleek black tuxedo with a bow tie or classic spy suit for the true 007 look.


Decoding Décor for NSBW25

Transform your cafeteria into a thrilling mystery scene where students will be excited to "investigate" their breakfast! Here are ten detective-inspired decorating ideas to get you started:

- 1. Wrap it in Caution Tape: Try wrapping doors and tables with caution tape for a "crime scene" vibe. It's easy to find at dollar stores or party supply shops.
- 2. Fingerprint Wall Art: Try cutting oversized fingerprint shapes from black card stock or poster paper to make a bold statement.
- 3. Set Up a Photo Booth: Design a "Suspect Lineup" backdrop with height measurements and add amusing props like hats, trench coats and magnifying glasses for a great photo op!
- 4. Feature Your Staff as Suspects: Take silly "mug shots" of cafeteria staff and display them as the suspects in your mystery for an extra interactive touch.
- 5. Top Secret Folders: Use manila folders labeled "Top Secret" to hold the menu, trivia questions or utensils—making them part of the overall mystery.

6. Spy Gadget Accents: Scatter toy binoculars, flashlights and other spy gear across serving tables for a truly interactive experience.

- 7. Spy Silhouettes: Hang cutouts of spy figures, magnifying glasses or trench-coat silhouettes from the ceiling for a dramatic touch.
- 8. Feetprints Leading te Clues: Cut black or white paper footprints and tape them along the floor, guiding students to the serving stations or special mystery-themed items.
- 9. Invisible Ink Messages: Use white crayons to write hidden messages on black paper-students can try to "solve the mystery" and discover what's written!
- 10. Crime Scene Evidence Markers: Label food items with playful names like "Suspect Sandwiches" or "Clue Cookies" using small table tents or folded index cards.

Engaging Detectives of All Ages

NSBW is a great opportunity to bring excitement and creativity to the cafeteria. By adjusting the theme to suit the age group you serve it's easy to keep students engaged. Here's how to bring the mystery-solving fun to elementary, middle and high school students!

Elementary School

For younger students, focus on compelling and familiar characters and hands-on activities. You can decorate the cafeteria with beloved detectives like Scooby-Doo or Perry the Platypus. Another great idea is to host a Detective Dress-Up Day, where students can come dressed as their favorite sleuths.

Middle School

Middle schoolers can handle a bit more complexity in their mystery-solving activities. Introduce famous teen sleuths like Nancy Drew or The Hardy Boys in decorations and activities. You can also incorporate mystery food taste tests by incorporating subtle ingredients, such as hidden spices or veggies, for the students to identify.

High School

High school students are ready for more sophisticated mysteries and challenges. Bring in iconic detectives like Sherlock Holmes, Hercule Poirot or true crime to appeal to older students. For breakfast, create advanced taste tests where students identify multiple secret ingredients in a dish, testing their palates and detective skills. Create puzzles where students can work together to solve a food-related case or set up a scavenger hunt with clues about healthy eating hidden around the cafeteria, leading to a prize.

Breakfast + Movies… It's Elementary My Dear Watson!

Detectives in the Classroom

If your school serves breakfast in the classroom, teachers play a vital role in making National School Breakfast Week both inviting and educational.

Incorporating a mystery theme is a great way to captivate students. Teachers can create mini "detective missions" where students solve clues related to breakfast items, such as guessing foods based on their health benefits or identifying mystery ingredients in a taste test. They can also lead quick discussions about the importance of a balanced breakfast, explaining how certain foods help fuel energy and focus.

To enhance the experience, teachers can decorate the classroom with clue stations or detective posters and host breakfast challenges like a clue hunt or nutrition quiz. These interactive activities make learning about healthy eating exciting and memorable!

Clue In ... to Reading!

Incorporating your school's library into National School Breakfast Week is a great way to engage students with detectivethemed stories while promoting reading.

Reach out to your school's librarian (or even your local public library) to ask them to feature detective/mystery books in library displays or schedule detective-themed story times for students.

Libraries can also organize book fairs or reading challenges centered around solving mysteries, sparking students' imaginations and encouraging them to explore.
